




This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Stockton Unified School District expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.



Plan Summary [2023-24]

General Information

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten–12, as applicable to the LEA.

Pacific Law Academy is a dependent Charter high school within Stockton Unified School District. Pacific Law Academy (PLA) opened in 2011 and graduated its first class of seniors with the Class of 2012. The Pacific Law Academy (PLA) diverse student population is representative of the SUSD population with approximately 70% Hispanic-Latino, 8% African-American, and the remaining population of Filipino, Asian, Mixed and Caucasian. PLA is a small high school with a population of no more than 230 students on its physical campus. Class sizes average 25:1 teacher to student ratio. The Pacific Law Academy Work Sessions (PAWS) is an extra abbreviated period during the school day that allows time for intervention, study time, and time for students to make up assignments and quizzes.

PLA's English Learner (EL) population represents approximately 3.9% (2022 Dashboard) of our student body with the majority of EL students entering PLA as RFEP or being reclassified within their first year at PLA. Approximately 65% of our student's population are Reclassified English Language Learners (RFEP). PLA's Socioeconomic Disadvantaged population totals 69.7% (2022 Dashboard), and Foster Youth population is at 0.5% (2022 Dashboard).

Approximately 69.7% of Pacific Law Academy students qualify for free and reduced meals during the 2019-2020, 2021-2022, and 2022-2023 school-year.

PLA is a college prep charter high school with 100% student graduation and 68% graduating A-G compliant, college, career and community ready. PLA offers a Career Technical Education (CTE) pathway in legal practice, and all incoming 9th graders are enrolled in a class of Law and Society. Students then may continue the pathway with a course in Criminal Investigation and a course in competitive Mock Trial. In school-year 2022-2023, 10% of PLA students were enrolled in the Mock Trial class. Nearly 8% of PLA students were awarded the California Seal of Biliteracy for their mastery of multiple languages, and PLA was named a California Distinguished High School in 2019.

PLA students value a high quality, 21st century education that provides them skills and knowledge to be college, career and community ready upon graduation. Expectations focus on students taking ownership of their learning and outcomes through rigorous instruction across curriculum and teachers providing high quality first instruction to enhance student learning and engagement.

PLA has pursued several plans in the current 2022-2023 school-year in order to address the above concerns:

Hired .5 FTE Instructional Coaches for Math and ELA support (Math coach was not hired to due to staffing shortage)

Expanded PAWS by 30 minutes each week for additional student intervention focused on skills and learning gaps in Math and English.

Enhanced PLA's Leadership program to improve school spirit and student connectivity with PLA

Implemented a PLUS class in to build additional leadership opportunities.

Administrator PD opportunities were provided through Solution Tree and SUSD in Professional Learning Communities.

Science teachers attended regular PD focused in NGSS.

Implemented incentives for on-time attendance, especially period 1 tardiness by way of incentives and awards.

PLA will continue to pursue the same plans during the 2023-2024 School year.

LCAP Highlights

A brief overview of the LCAP, including any key features that should be emphasized.

Staff and students at Pacific Law Academy should be extremely proud of some of their accomplishments. In 2019, PLA was honored as a California Distinguished School for their consistent academic growth and PAWS program. PLA teachers are committed to PLA's academic growth. They implemented an intervention class during the school day and have continued to work to improve that program to fit the individual needs of all students. The PAWS class allows students to receive targeted and focused intervention from teachers across curriculum, The PAWS class has been a vital part of PLA's successful graduation rate (100%) and continual increase in the percentage of students prepared for college (68%).

PLA students follow an individualized four-year plan developed by students and their counselor. The Counselor monitors students' progress and consistently reaches works with our students throughout the four-years of high school to support students with academics, personal growth, and post-high school college, career, and community planning.

Instructional Coaches were introduced to PLA in 2019-2020 to assist with the development of new common core math and ELA curriculum as part of SUSD's district-wide growth implementation. Coaches have been able to work closely with Math and ELA. Coaches have also been able to assist science teachers in developing NGSS curriculum, social science teachers in lesson planning and support, and provide support for a new CTE teacher. Instructional Coaches will continue to support teachers as we move from Distance Learning and Hybrid Learning back into regular scheduled classes.

Leadership students have led a growth in spirit and student connectivity throughout 2022-2023, PLA opened a Tiger's Den in 2019-2020, giving students a place to study independently, study with a group, or take a healthy break from rigorous activities and lessons. Leadership opened the campus to the community with a successful Festival of Honor in which the community was invited to celebrate with PLA staff and students. Leadership events helped PLA grow in areas of creating meaningful relationships with students, families and the community. PLA continues to host a Summer Math program and offers classes in Algebra Support, Algebra I and Geometry to incoming PLA 9th graders and current PLA students as an intervention and/or academic enhancement opportunity. Seventh and eighth grade students from Kohl school attend Algebra I and Algebra 2 at PLA during the regular school year. Those students who decide to attend PLA come into high school with advanced math abilities and generally get through AP Calculus and Statistics before graduating high school. Although only 37% of PLA students are proficient in math (SBAC 2022), that score is approximately 20% above SUSD averages.

PLA teachers participate in numerous Professional Development opportunities. The science teachers participated throughout the year with SUSD in developing the NGSS curriculum and labs, the Art teacher attended a 3-day workshop on Art Standards and curriculum development, the PLA PLUS teacher and leadership teacher participated at the CADA conference, and all AP teachers enrolled in AP Summer Institute courses to support students in AP instruction and on the AP exams.

All teachers practiced their collaboration through Professional Learning Communities (PLC) as departments with elective teachers placed into departments where their contributions were relevant and supported core subject instruction.

Engaging Educational Partners

A needs assessment was accomplished following a series of discussions between teachers and staff during faculty meetings, School Site Council meetings, Tiger Talk advisory meetings, and with the PLA administrator around the current state of PLA. CA Dashboard (state data) and local data metrics were reviewed for input during scheduled meetings. These discussions, combined with student, parent, staff, and teacher surveys were qualified and quantified with data and actual results, considering the historical references of data as well. Based on the conversations, data analysis, and survey results, stakeholders agreed on several areas of growth.

A summary of the feedback provided by specific educational partners.

For several years, PLA had an issue with students not feeling connected to PLA. School Spirit was a low before school-year 2019-2020. Stakeholders agreed, and the survey results showed, that, although there is work to do, school spirit and student connectivity has increased at PLA over the 2019-2020, 2020-2021, 2021-2022, and 2022-2023 school-year. Stakeholders responded well to the community involvement growth over the year and the amount of time students spent advocating for the community through the several clubs on campus, such as Key Club. ELA standardized (SBAC) scores have increased over the last two years, and stakeholders were encouraged with the results. Math standardized (SBAC) have slightly decreased since the 2021 SBAC testing cycle from 44% to 37%. Math was an identified area of need and focus during the 2022-2023 SY in PAWS. Stakeholders agreed that PLA should continue stressing the importance of teachers remaining consistent with PAWS intervention and provide students with after-school tutoring whenever available. We will continue to monitor effectiveness moving into the 23-24 SY.

Pacific Law Academy continued to receive guidance and support from Stockton Unified School District in the development of the 2021-2024 LCAP specifically relating to the feedback and information provided by all stakeholders.

Regular updates were provided to PLA Staff, SSC and stakeholders starting in 2019-2020 to review the LCAP progress, information, and the three goals: 1) student achievement, 2) safe and healthy learning environments, and 3) meaningful partnerships. These goals continued to align with the district's Blueprint for Student Achievement, Local Education Plan, and administrative expectations. The goal statements have been conveyed to stakeholders with positive acknowledgement.

Progress and challenges have been evident in meeting our goal of Pacific Law Academy (PLA) providing all students with a well-rounded educational experience, the delivery of high-quality instruction, and exposure to a rigorous and relevant curriculum to become lifelong learners. PLA will Increase student achievement by providing high-quality first instruction supported by a Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) to graduate every single youth college, career, and community ready. The following actions have shown different levels of effectiveness as explained below:

Actions listed in 1.1:

Instructional Coaching - Has continued to be successful in increasing of ELA achievement to 83%, a 2% growth from 20-21 SY. We are still struggling to attain a permanent Math coach to support our math programs.

Academic Counseling - Student A-G rate has remained a solid 68%. Students are being accepted to college at record numbers. The 22-23 SY showed 3 student receiving full CIP scholarships.

Social-emotional counseling - Student have shown that creating an inviting culture is still a priority at PLA as detailed in PLUS and HK survey.

Data-driven decision making - Teachers continue to work in their Department and grade level PLC's, meeting 2 times a month for 3 hours total time.

Professional development - PLA staff remains committed to providing the best educational experience possible. By doing this we do ensure our staff have the most up to date PD and resources available to them.

Student resources - Students are provided the most up to date curriculum/technology available.

Digital consultants - Digital consultants were not implemented this year.

These actions are being provided on an LEA-wide basis and we expect/hope that all students with less than a 100 percent attendance rate will benefit. However, because of the significantly lower attendance rate of low-income students, and because the actions meet needs most associated with the chronic stresses and experiences of a socio-economically disadvantaged status, we expect that the attendance rate for our low-income students will increase significantly more than the average attendance rate of all other students. (Measurable Outcomes [Effective In])
